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I. Key Findings

- On Thursday, January 23, 2025, the day of the Point-in-Time Count, 717 individuals were counted. In 2024, 837 individuals were counted. A comparison of these two counts reveals that 120 less individuals were counted in 2025, which represents a decrease of 14.3%.
- Of the 717 individuals counted, 343 adults and 3 children, under age 18, were unsheltered and 330 adults and 41 children, under age 18, were sheltered.
- The number of adults and children under age 18 who were unsheltered decreased from 428 individuals in 2024 to 346 individuals in 2025 representing a decrease of 82 individuals or 19.2%.
- The number of sheltered adults and children under age 18 decreased from 409 in 2024 to 371 in 2025 representing a decrease of 38 individuals or 9.3%.
- The number of sheltered children experiencing homelessness decreased from 56 in 2024 to 41 in 2025 representing a decrease of 15 children or 26.8%.
- 37.2% of sheltered persons and 32.1% of unsheltered persons identified as a Woman (Girl if child).
- 29.9% of sheltered adults and 19.1% of unsheltered adults were age 55+.
- 28.6% (106) of sheltered adults and 30.6% (106) of unsheltered adults were between the age 50-64. This equals a total of 210 adults between the ages of 50-64.
- 47.6% of sheltered individuals and 50.1% of unsheltered individuals were chronically homeless.
- 47.7% of sheltered individuals and 46.8% of unsheltered individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino/Latina alone or with another race.
- Nearly three-fourths (72.5%) of individuals counted as sheltered and unsheltered were in the City of Merced.
- 58.9% of unsheltered individuals are aware of the housing and homeless services available in Merced County.
- 19.2% of unsheltered individuals were told by a doctor or other medical professional that they had a chronic health condition that is life-threatening such as heart, lung, liver, kidney or cancerous disease.
- 17.2% of unsheltered individuals became homeless for the first time during the past 12 months.
- More than half (56.6%) of unsheltered adults had no income.

II. Background Information Concerning the Point-in-Time Count

The Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires Continuum of Care's (CoCs) that receive CoC Program funding to conduct an unsheltered "one night point-in-time" Point-in-Time (PIT) Count every other year during the last 10 days of January. HUD also requires CoCs to complete a sheltered count, annually, of people experiencing homelessness who reside in emergency shelter, transitional housing, and Safe Havens on a single night. Merced CoC has elected to conduct both a sheltered and unsheltered Point-in-Time Count on an annual basis.

1. When Was the Count Conducted?

The unsheltered count was conducted on Thursday, January 23, 2025. The sheltered count was conducted overnight on Wednesday, January 22, 2025, in shelters and transitional housing programs.

2. Who was Counted?

Utilizing the HUD definition of [literally homelessness under Category 1](#), a person was counted if they were observed living within one of the following places described below:

- In places not meant for human habitation, such as cars, parks, sidewalks, and abandoned buildings;
- In an emergency shelter; and
- In transitional housing for homeless persons who originally came from the streets or emergency shelter.

Individuals considered to be At Risk of Homelessness were not included within the Point-in-Time Count. HUD defines individuals that are "near homelessness" or individuals that are "doubled up" as [At Risk of Homelessness](#) and not literally homeless.

Households living below the poverty level are at risk of becoming homeless. Because of their limited income, they frequently have to choose between paying their rent, mortgage, and other daily living costs such as childcare, food, clothing, healthcare, and transportation. The generally accepted standard for housing affordability is that households should not spend more than 30% of their incomes on rent and utilities.

The Merced CoC geographical area, which includes the County of Merced, has a substantial number of households that are at-risk of homelessness. Approximately 18.6% of Merced County residents were living below the poverty level according to the July 1, 2024 [U.S. Census Bureau QuickFacts](#) data. This means that of the 296,774 Merced County residents approximately 55,200

individuals, representing nearly 17,000 households based on the 3.32 persons per household census calculation for Merced County were at risk of becoming homeless.

Many households can become homeless because of challenges such as increases in rent, job loss, and rising healthcare costs. In addition, personal experiences such as domestic violence, physical disability, mental illness, and substance abuse are also contributing factors to homelessness. Often, one or more of these experiences play a role in a household's experience of homelessness.

3. Who Conducted the Count?

There were 114 volunteers that carried out the unsheltered count on January 23rd, of which 15 were persons with lived experience. This group consisted of a wide range of local representatives from various public and private organizations that included:

- Businesses;
- Faith-based organizations;
- Homeless and Formerly Homeless individuals;
- Local governments; and
- Non-profit organizations.

In addition, staff from shelters and transitional housing programs counted residents in their respective programs.

4. Reporting the Count – Rounding Errors

Please note that some of the values presented in this report may be subject to rounding errors. Due to the use of rounding to present data in a more accessible format, the sum of individual components may not exactly match the reported totals. These discrepancies are minimal and should not significantly impact the overall analysis or conclusions drawn from the data. We advise reviewing the data with an understanding of the rounding process, and if precise values are needed for further analysis, the raw, unrounded figures are available upon request.

III. Total Number of Homeless Persons

There were 717 individuals who were counted as homeless on Thursday, January 23, 2025. In 2024, 837 individuals were counted. A comparison of these two counts reveals that 120 less people were counted in 2025, which represents a decrease of 14.3%.



Of the 717 persons counted in 2025, 330 adults and 41 children were sheltered and 343 adults and 3 children were unsheltered.

The following chart illustrates the increase of the number of persons experiencing homelessness between 2018 and 2025. There were 711 individuals counted in 2025, which is an increase of 197 persons or 38.3% when compared to the total number of 514 individuals counted in 2018.

It is important to note that the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) limits the count to persons who are defined as

- Homeless persons living in a place not designed or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for humans (these persons must be counted as unsheltered); and
- Persons living in emergency shelters and transitional housing projects (these persons must be counted as sheltered).

Regarding sheltered homelessness, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) states that

- *CoCs must count all individuals or families who meet the criteria in paragraph (1)(ii) of the homeless definition in 24 CFR 578.3. This includes individuals and families “**living in a supervised publicly or privately operated shelter designated to provide temporary living arrangements (including congregate shelters, transitional housing, and hotels and motels paid for by charitable organizations or by federal, state, or local government programs for low-income individuals)**” on the night designated for the count. This includes individuals residing in Safe Haven projects.*

Regarding unsheltered homelessness, HUD states that

- *CoCs must count all individuals or families who meet the criteria in paragraph (1)(i) of the homeless definition in 24 CFR 578.3. This includes individuals and families “**with a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings, including a car, park, abandoned building, bus or train station, airport, or camping ground**” on the night designated for the count. RRH-assisted households who are still unsheltered on the night of the count (e.g., staying in an encampment and being assisted by an RRH project to obtain housing) must be included as part of the unsheltered count.*

The following table provides a breakdown of the total number of unsheltered and sheltered persons counted in 2025 by jurisdiction. Nearly three-fourths (72.5%) of people counted were in the City of Merced.

The following table provides a 2024 and 2025 comparison of unsheltered and sheltered persons by jurisdiction. The City of Merced has the largest total population of individuals experiencing homelessness. The total number of people counted as unsheltered was nearly the same in 2025. However, the total number of sheltered people decreased by 14.9%. The total number of people counted as sheltered in 2024 was 376 and 320 in 2025.

IV. Unsheltered Persons

1. Methodology

A survey instrument was used to gather unsheltered data by the volunteers. The survey data was gathered primarily by utilizing the Simtech Solutions, Inc “Counting Us” mobile application. Volunteers entered survey questions on their mobile devices where survey data was instantly submitted to a regional command center. The survey questions were focused on gathering demographic and subpopulation information as required by HUD.

The survey instrument focused on gathering responses to determine the number of individuals counted for each subpopulation required by HUD. The survey instrument also gathered responses to other questions that were used to create a unique identifier that was used to determine if any persons were counted more than once. Each person was only included once in the total number of people counted. All information gathered through the survey instrument remains confidential.

HUD requires the total number of unsheltered adults and children under age 18 to be broken down by the following subpopulation categories:

- Age;
- Gender; and
- Race/Ethnicity

Of the 346 unsheltered persons counted, 343 were adults and were asked to respond to the survey questions. Of the 343 adults, 178 individuals or 51.9%, were directly surveyed and 165 adults or 48.1%, were counted by observation. Adults were counted by observation because for various reasons they were unable to be surveyed such as refusing to be surveyed or the person was sleeping. Thus, extrapolation was used, to determine certain results. For example, 24.4% of the adults surveyed answered that they had a physical disability, it was assumed that 24.4% of the adults who were counted by observation also had a physical disability.

2. Age

Of the 346 individuals counted as unsheltered, 343 were adults and 3 were children under age 18. One unsheltered family included two children, and one included one child.

- Adults with a Serious Mental Illness;
- Adults with a Substance Use Disorder;
- Chronically Homeless Individuals;
- Single Individuals; and

- Veterans.

- Developmental Disability
- Physical Disability

8. Unsheltered Subpopulation Data by City

Appendix A includes a detailed breakdown of individuals by subpopulation for cities with an unsheltered population of 50 or more adults. This includes the City of Los Banos with 84 unsheltered adults and the City of Merced with 200 unsheltered adults.

V. Sheltered Persons

As required by HUD, the sheltered count records the number of persons and households residing in emergency shelters (including seasonal shelters), transitional housing, and Safe Haven programs (of which the Merced CoC has none) that were listed on the Housing Inventory Chart (HIC). In addition, any persons staying in a hotel or motel as a result of a voucher from a social service agency were included in the sheltered count per HUD's instructions. The voucher program was listed within the HIC.

1. Methodology

HUD encourages the use of Homeless Management Information Services (HMIS) data to generate sheltered counts and subpopulation data for programs that have 100% of their project beds in HMIS. Thus, HMIS was used to gather the total number of occupied beds and a breakdown of the number of sheltered adults and children by subpopulation (see Tables 13 – 17 below) for nearly all sheltered programs. Program managed shelter data was used for projects that do not participate in HMIS.
